calculates the distance to an object (perhaps a wall) and then detonates the shell just past that point, spraying deadly metal fragments down on

the victims. The OICW can literally shoot around corners and over walls. But, will it be a soldier or child behind that wall?

Not being able to discern, the OICW is an indiscriminate weapon and illegal under all International Laws. And what will happen when criminals have this weapon? How can our peace officers or you be safe on our streets? "Our theme is

'No place to hide'" says the Army's program manager. Alliant currently has a 8.5 million dollar development contract to produce seven working models of the OICW. If and when the weapon is accepted, Alliant will receive a production contract valued at over one

half billion dollars. Tentative plans call for production beginning in the year 2005. The cost of each rifle is approximately \$10,000.00. With the Objective Individual Combat Weapon, soldiers (or criminals) no long need worry about a steady and careful aim. Like a camera, they only need look through a viewfinder and pull the trigger – sending out a barrage of shells. "We're going to take the human factor out as

much as possible," explains Major James Baldwin of the US Army. The OICW will "revolutionize warfare much as the introduction of the machine gun did early in this century,"

says Don Sticinski of Alliant Techsystems, "its unique capabilities will enable US combat troops to virtually shoot around corners to defeat targets behind barriers." Once US forces start to carry the new weapon, the pressure to give or sell the OICW to other NATO forces will become irresistible. The

weapon is a joint venture between four multinational corporations including Dynamit Nobel AG of Germany. Alliant is the primary contractor for the project.
